PERSONNEL REDUCTION

The Board of Education may reduce the number of probationary and permanent certificated employees when, in the opinion of the Board its opinion, one or more any of the following conditions makes such reduction necessary: (Education Code 44955)

- 1. Average daily attendance (ADA) in all of the schools in the District during the first six months of the school year has declined below the level for the same period in either of the previous two school years. (Education Code 44955)
- 2. A particular kind of service is to be reduced or discontinued not later than the beginning of the following school year. (Education Code 44955)
- 3. Attendance in the District will decline in the following year as a result of the termination of an interdistrict tuition agreement. (Education Code 44955)
- 4. An amendment of state law requires modification of the curriculum. (Education Code 44955)
- 5. During the time period between five days after the enactment of the Budget Act and August 15 of that fiscal year, the Board determines The state Budget Act reveals that the District's total revenue limit per ADA for the fiscal year of that Budget Act has not increased by at least two percent. (Education Code 44955.5)

Seniority Determination of the Order of Layoffs

When it is necessary to reduce the number of certificated employees for any of the reasons listed above, the services of employees shall be terminated in the inverse of the order in which they were employed by the District in probationary status, except as otherwise authorized by law. (Education Code 44844, 44955)

Except as otherwise provided by law, a permanent employee who is certificated and competent to render a service shall not be terminated or given a reduction in hours and wages while a probationary employee or other employee with less seniority is retained to render the service. (Education Code 44955)

Prior to determining the seniority of employees, the Superintendent or designee shall require certificated employees to provide verification, in writing, of their employment date and credentials, as well as any documentation supporting an employment or credential(s) different from that shown in the District's records.

The Superintendent or designee shall prepare a master maintain the seniority list for this purpose and shall make it available upon request. on the basis of District records and evidence presented. (Education Code 44864)

Unless otherwise provided by law, a permanent employee shall have the right to be retained over a probationary employee or any employee with less seniority if the position is one for which he/she is certificated and competent to render service. (Education Code 44955)

Upon the request of any employee whose order of termination is so determined based on such ranking, the Board shall furnish, in writing, the employee, no later than five days prior to the commencement of the administrative hearing on the layoff, a written statement of the specific criteria used in determining the order of termination and the application of the criteria in ranking the employee relative to the other employees in the group. (Education Code 44955)

2. To maintain or achieve compliance with constitutional requirements related to equal protection of the law

Notice and Hearing Rights

When it becomes necessary, as the result of a reduction or discontinuation of services, to reduce the number of permanent and/or probationary employees pursuant to Education Code 44955 as specified in items #1-4 above, the District shall give notice to the affected employees, no later than March 15, stating the reasons for the action and the employees' right to a hearing. no later than March 15.— The District shall adhere to the notice, hearing, and layoff procedures in Education Code 44949, and 44955, and other applicable provisions of law.

When an employee has requested a hearing before an administrative law judge regarding the reduction or discontinuation of services, the Board shall make a final decision regarding the sufficiency of the cause and disposition of the layoff upon receipt of the administrative law judge's proposed decision. None of the findings, recommendations, or determinations of the administrative law judge shall be binding on the Board. (Education Code 44949)

The Board may conduct its own hearing, adopt the administrative law judge's proposed decision, refer the case back to the administrative law judge for additional evidence, or reject or modify the proposed decision and make its own determination based upon its review of the record.

Upon adoption of Following the Board's decision, the Superintendent or designee shall give final notice, in the manner specified, to the affected employees before May 15 unless the parties agree otherwise in accordance with procedures required by law. (Education Code 44955)

When layoffs become necessary pursuant to Education Code 44955.5 as specified in item #5 above, layoff proceedings shall be carried out as required by law but in accordance with a schedule of notice and hearing adopted by the Board. (Education Code 44955.5)

Special Procedure Based Upon Late Adoption of the State Budget

When the Board, during the time period between five days after enactment of the Budget Act and August 15, determines that the total revenue limit per ADA has not increased by at least two percent and that the District therefore needs to reduce the number of certificated staff pursuant to Education Code 44955.5, the Board shall adopt a schedule of notice and hearings and the District shall otherwise proceed pursuant to Education Code 44949 and 44955. (Education Code 44955.5)

PERSONNEL REDUCTION (continued)

Reappointment

If the number of employees is increased or the discontinued service reestablished, permanent certificated employees under 65 years of age shall have the right to reappointment, in order of seniority, for 39 months from the date of termination after being terminated. Probationary certificated employees under 65 years of age shall have the same right for 24 months after being terminated, subject to the prior reappointment rights of permanent employees. (Education Code 44846, 44956, 44957)

During the period of the preferred right to reappointment, permanent certificated employees shall, in the order of original employment, be offered first opportunity for substitute service during the absence of any employee who has been granted a leave of absence or who is temporarily absent from duty. Such substitute service may be terminated upon the return to duty of the other employee. Such substitute service shall not affect the retention of the employees' previous classification and rights. Probationary certificated employees shall have the same right to substitute service during the period of preferred right to reappointment to the extent required by law, subject to the rights of permanent certificated employees. (Education Code 44918, 44956, 44957)

The Superintendent or designee shall administer mandatory student assessments within the State Standardized Testing And Reporting (STAR) Program California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) as required by law and in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

- 2. Modifying test administration procedures, except as allowed by law
- 3. Provideing inappropriate assistance to students during test administration
- 4. Changeing or filling in answers on student answer sheets
- 5. Provideing inaccurate data on student header sheets
- 6. Discourageing or excludeing certain students from taking the test
- 7. Engageing in any other practice to artificially raise student scores without actually improving underlying student achievement in academic content areas

TEST INTEGRITY/TEST PREPARATION (continued)

Appropriate Test Preparation for State Tests

Staff may prepare students for assessments by providing instruction in the content specified in State and District academic standards and teaching general test taking strategies that are designed to improve their performance on tests included in the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) program, the California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE), or the California English Language Development Test (CELDT). Such strategies may include, but not be limited to, using time efficiently, understanding directions, placing answers correctly on answer sheets, checking answers, problem solving tactics, and exposing students to various test formats.

The Superintendent or designee, principals, and teachers shall not implement any program for the sole purpose of specific test preparation of students for the statewide student assessment program system or a particular test used within that program in the statewide assessment system. (Education Code 60611)

The primary preparation for assessments shall be high-quality instruction in the content specified in state and District academic standards. In addition, staff may prepare students for assessments by teaching general test-taking strategies and familiarizing them with item types or the computer-based testing environment used in state assessments.

Practice tests provided by the publisher of the state achievement test may be used for the limited purpose of familiarizing students with the use of scanable test booklets or answer sheets and the format of test items. No alternate or parallel form of the test shall be administered or used. (5 CCR-854)

Staff may use released test questions within the District's standards based instructional program for the limited purpose of familiarizing students with the structure and format of the items and with strategies for taking multiple choice tests. Released items should not be used to develop practice tests and mimic or parallel State tests, or for teaching or drilling students.

Investigation and Consequences of Testing Irregularities

Reports of student cheating on assessments shall be submitted to the principal Superintendent or designee for investigation. The Superintendent or designee shall immediately investigate with due diligence any reports of inappropriate test preparation or other testing irregularities.

TEST INTEGRITY/TEST PREPARATION (continued)

Students found to have cheated on assessments shall be subject to disciplinary procedures in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulations.

TOBACCO

The Board of Education recognizes that tobacco use presents the serious health risks presented by tobacco use and desires to ensure that, through adoption of consistent policies, District students are made aware of those risks and, to the extent possible, protected from them provide support and assistance in reducing the number of students who begin or continue to use tobacco. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive coordinated school health system which program that includes a comprehensive behavioral health education component that teaches students the knowledge, skills, and attitudes they need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors, such as tobacco use. consistent enforcement of laws prohibiting tobacco possession and use by students, tobacco use prevention education including youth development activities, and intervention and cessation activities and/or referrals.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide prevention, intervention, cessation education and information, activities, and/or referrals to District students and shall ensure consistent enforcement of District policies prohibiting student possession and use of tobacco products.

Prohibition Against Tobacco Use

Students shall not possess, smoke, or use tobacco, or any product containing tobacco or nicotine, while on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of District employees. Prohibited products include, but are not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, miniature cigars, clove cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, snuff, chew packets, and betel. (Education Code 48900, 48901)

Student's possession or use of nicotine delivery devices, such as electronic eigarettes, is also prohibited. (This includes any device which provides an inhalable dose of nicotine by delivering a vaporized solution. Health and Safety Code 119405, added by SB 882 (Ch 312, Statutes of 2010) makes it unlawful for a person to sell or otherwise furnish an electronic eigarette to a minor under age 18.)

TOBACCO (continued)

Student's possession or use of electronic cigarettes, electronic hookahs, and other vaporemitting devices, with or without nicotine content, that mimic the use of tobacco products is also prohibited.

These prohibitions do not apply to a student's possession or use of his/her own prescription products. However, student possession or use of prescription products in school shall be subject to the District's policy and regulation for addressing the administration of medications on campus. (Education Code 48900, 48901)

Program Planning

The District's tobacco-use prevention and intervention program shall be based on an assessment of tobacco-use problems in District schools and the community, an examination of existing services and activities in the community, and a determination of high-risk student populations that are most in need of District services.

He/she may establish an advisory council including students, parents/guardians, District staff, representatives of the local health department and community organizations, law enforcement professionals, and/or others with demonstrated expertise in tobacco prevention and cessations.

DISCIPLINE

The Board of Education desires is committed to provide providing a safe, supportive, and positive school environment which is conducive to student learning and to prepare preparing students for responsible citizenship by fostering self-discipline and personal responsibility. The Board believes that high expectations for student behavior, use of effective school and classroom management strategies, provision of appropriate intervention and support, and parent involvement can minimize the need for disciplineary measures that exclude students from instruction as a means for correcting student misbehavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall approve, for each school, design a complement of effective, age-appropriate strategies for maintaining a positive school climate and correcting student misbehavior at District schools. The strategies shall focus on providing students with needed supports; communicating clear, appropriate, and consistent expectations and consequences for student conduct; and ensuring equity and continuous improvement in the implementation of District discipline policies and practices. Such strategies may include, but are not limited to, conferences with students and their parents/guardians; use of study, guidance, or other intervention related teams; enrollment in a program teaching prosocial behavior or anger management; and participation in a restorative justice program. Staff shall use preventative measures and positive conflict resolution techniques whenever possible. Disciplinary measures that may result in loss of instructional time or cause students to be disengaged from school, such as suspension and expulsion, shall be imposed only when required by law and when other means of correction have failed. (Education Code 48900.5)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee's strategies shall reflect the Board's preference for the use of positive interventions and alternative disciplinary measures over exclusionary discipline measures as a means for correcting student misbehavior.

Disciplinary measures that may result in loss of instructional time or cause students to be disengaged from school, such as detention, suspension, and expulsion, shall be imposed only when required by law or when other means of correction have been documented to have failed. (Education Code 48900.5)

The administrative staff at each school may develop disciplinary rules to meet the school's particular needs consistent with law, Board policy, and District regulations. However, the rules shall be consistent with law, Board policy, and District regulations. Site-level disciplinary rules shall be included in the District's comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 35291.5, 32282)

At all times, the safety of students and staff and the maintenance of an orderly school environment shall be priorities in determining appropriate discipline. When choosing between different disciplinary strategies, staff shall consider the effect of each option on the student's health, well-being, and opportunity to learn.

Persistently disruptive students may be assigned to alternative programs or removed from school in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

District goals for improving school climate, based on suspension and expulsion rates, surveys of students, staff, and parents/guardians regarding their sense of school safety, and other local measures, shall be included in the District's local control and accountability plan, as required by law.

At the beginning of every school year, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board regarding disciplinary strategies used in each District schools in the immediately preceding school year and their effect on student learning in the school.

Corporal Punishment

Corporal punishment shall not be used as a disciplinary measure against any student. Corporal punishment includes the willful infliction of, or willfully causing the infliction of, physical pain on a student. (Education Code 49001)

However, corporal punishment does not include any pain or discomfort suffered by a student as a result of his/her voluntary participation in an athletic or other recreational competition or activity. In addition, an employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to protect himself/herself, students, staff, or other persons, to prevent damage to property, or to obtain possession of weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student is not corporal punishment. (Education Code 49001)

CLASS SIZE

The Board of Education recognizes that smaller classes may contribute to student learning by allowing teachers to better the number of students in a class may affect the extent to which teachers can identify and respond to individual student needs. In accordance with negotiated employee agreements and state law, and upon the recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board shall establish upper and lower class size limits appropriate for the subject or each grade level or subject taught and conducive to the effective use of teaching staff.

The highest priority for maintaining small class sizes shall be in the primary grades in order to support young students as they acquire the basic skills that serve as the foundation for subsequent learning. Other priorities shall be established in accordance with the goals and strategies identified in the District's local control and accountability plan (LCAP).

For grades K-3, the District shall annually make progress toward maintaining an average class of not more than 24 students, unless an alternative annual average class size for each school site is collectively bargained. (Education Code 42238.02; 5 CCR 15498-15498.3)

Transitional kindergarten classes established pursuant to Education Code 48000 shall be included in the calculation of average class enrollment for kindergarten.

At the secondary level, District priorities for class size reduction shall focus on English language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, and other courses that are necessary for completion of graduation requirements and shall be aligned with student needs as identified in the District's LCAP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with an analysis of staffing and school facilities needs and other costs related to class size reduction proposals.

Full time mainstreamed Special Education students shall not be included in determining class size for purposes of the class size reduction program.

WHEREAS, all students deserve to be treated with dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS, more than 700,000 students with disabilities receive special education services in California, comprising more than 10 percent of the state's public school enrollment; and

WHEREAS, students with disabilities are sons, daughters, sisters, brothers, friends, and neighbors; and

WHEREAS, the contributions of students with disabilities enrich our communities as they live, learn, and share their lives; and

WHEREAS, the language used to refer to students with disabilities has a profound impact in shaping beliefs and attitudes about these students, driving policies and laws, influencing our feelings and decisions, and affecting students' daily lives; and

WHEREAS, old, inaccurate, and inappropriate descriptors about students with disabilities perpetuate negative stereotypes and attitudinal barriers; and

WHEREAS, when we identify or describe students with disabilities primarily in terms of their disability or medical diagnosis, we undervalue and stigmatize them; and

WHEREAS, using thoughtful terminology can foster positive attitudes about students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, one of the major improvements in communicating verbally or in writing with or about students with disabilities is People First Language, which places the person ahead of his or her disability; and

WHEREAS, People First Language is an objective form of communication that eliminates generalizations and stereotypes by focusing on the person rather than the disability; and

WHEREAS, For example, we do not refer to a child with cancer as a "cancerous child," and similarly, we should not refer to a child with autism as an "autistic child" or a child with epilepsy as "an epileptic child;" and

WHEREAS, a recent report of California's Statewide Task Force on Special Education entitled, "One System: Reforming Education to Serve All Students," called for a unified, inclusive educational system that supports all students based on individual needs; and

WHEREAS, the manner in which written and verbal policies and communications refer to students with disabilities can further this important state educational goal; and

WHEREAS, The California Legislature recognizes the necessity of a more respectful and humanistic view of students with disabilities.

In 2013-2014, \$25 million was appropriated to the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to allocate funding for two-year planning and implementation grants. Assembly Bill 86 (AB86) outlines expectations for consortium development as well as planning and implementation requirements to establish the Adult Education Consortium Program. The intent of AB86 is to expand and improve the provision of adult education.

The new phase of AB86 is the transition into AB104, the Adult Education Block Grant (AEBG) and outlines the transition from planning to implementation of the regional plan submitted to the CCCCO on March 1, 2015. Per AB104 section 84905 of the legislation "a member of the consortium shall be represented only by an official designated by the governing board of the member."

Rialto Unified School District has offered full support of AB86 since its inception in 2013 by being active participants on the Executive Committee, the Steering Committee and the work group hubs.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve Dr. Cuauhtémoc Avila to serve as an official representative on the San Bernardino Community College District Adult Education Consortium Executive Committee through June 30, 2016. If the Official Representative is unable to attend, they can select a non-voting designee to attend on their behalf.

AGREEMENT WITH ATI ARCHITECTS AND ENGINEERS FOR THE NEW COMPRESSED NATURAL GAS (CNG) STATION

At its meeting of March 12, 2014, the Board of Education approved an agreement with ATI Architects and Engineers to prepare an overall site plan, engineering plans and bid packages for the new Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Fueling Station (Phase 1) and the master plan for the relocation of the Transportation Yard (Phase 2). Subsequently, on September 24, 2014, the Board of Education approved Amendment No. 1 to allow fee adjustment during the design phase in accordance with the terms and conditions of the original agreement. The contract amount currently approved is \$263,200.00 which is calculated based on the estimated construction cost of \$2,517,513.00. The original Agreement No.C-14-0119 expired on June 30, 2015.

In order to continue the architectural services to take the project to completion, a new agreement with the architect is required. NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The firm of Gutierrez, Fierro & Erickson, a Professional Corporation ("Firm"), is hereby appointed as the District's prosecuting authority and it is authorized to investigate, file and conduct legal civil proceedings on behalf of the District arising out of various claims for payment by several persons and entities. The Board also approves payment to the Firm for such services at the rates set forth in the District's existing agreement with the Firm.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Board authorizes and directs the Superintendent and all District employees to assist and cooperate with the Firm in order to assist the Firm to discharge its functions as the District's prosecuting authority.
