

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANCE

The Board of Education recognizes that volunteer assistance in schools can enrich the educational program, increase supervision of students, and contribute to school safety while strengthening the schools' relationships with the community. The Board encourages parents/guardians and other members of the community to share their time, knowledge, and abilities with students.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement a plan for recruiting, screening, and placing volunteers, including strategies for reaching underrepresented groups of parents/guardians and community members. He/she may also recruit community members to serve as mentors and/or make appropriate referrals to community organizations.

The District has established two levels of volunteers:

- 1. Level I volunteers have direct student contact and supervision of students. To become a Level I volunteer, complete a volunteer application form, along with a background check and fingerprint clearance, a TB clearance, and a Hold Harmless form through the District Personnel office.
- 2. Level II volunteers have non-student contact and are supervised by a classified or certificated staff member at the discretion of the site administrator. To be a Level II volunteer, complete a volunteer application form, be cleared through Megans Law, a TB clearance, and complete a Hold Harmless form.

Effective December 1, 2014, volunteers will be responsible for the cost of fingerprinting and TB testing.

The Board prohibits harassment of any volunteer on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status. (Government Code 12940)

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall provide volunteers with information about school goals, programs, and practices and an orientation or other training related to their specific responsibilities. Employees who supervise volunteers shall ensure that volunteers are assigned meaningful responsibilities that utilize their skills and expertise and maximize their contribution to the educational program.

Volunteer maintenance work shall be limited to those projects that do not replace the normal maintenance duties of classified staff. The Board nevertheless encourages volunteers to work on short-term projects to the extent that they enhance the classroom or school, do not significantly increase maintenance workloads, and comply with employee negotiated agreements.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for determining whether volunteers possess the qualifications, if any, required by law and administrative regulation for types of duties they will perform.

Volunteer aides shall not be used to assist certificated staff in performing teaching or administrative responsibilities in place of regularly authorized classified employees who have been laid off. (Education Code 35021)

Volunteers shall act in accordance with District policies, regulations, and school rules. The Superintendent or designee shall be responsible for investigating and resolving complaints regarding volunteers.

LACTATION ACCOMMODATION

The Board of Education recognizes the immediate and long-term health advantages of breast feeding for infants and mothers and desires to provide a supportive environment for any District employee to express milk for her infant child upon her return to work or school following the birth of the child. The Board prohibits discrimination, harassment, and/or retaliation against any District employee who chooses to express breast milk or breast feed for her infant child while at work.

(cf. 4031 - Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment)

The District shall provide a reasonable amount of break time to accommodate an employee or student each time she has a need to express breast milk for her infant child. For a student, the accommodation is determined at a meeting with the school nurse, student, and parent/guardian if the student is under age eighteen. (Labor Code 1030)

To the extent possible, such break time shall run concurrently with the break time already provided to the employee. Any additional break time used by a non-exempt employee for this purpose shall be unpaid. An employee shall be provided with access to a place to store the breast milk safely. (Labor Code 1030; 29 USC 207)

The employee shall be provided a private location, other than a restroom, which is in close proximity to her work area and meets the requirements of Labor Code 1031 and 29 USC 207, as applicable.

Employees are encouraged to notify their supervisor or other appropriate personnel in advance of their intent to make use of the accommodations offered for employees who are nursing mothers. As needed, the supervisor shall work with the employee to address arrangements and scheduling in order to ensure that the employee' essential job duties are covered during the break time.

Lactation accommodations may be denied only in limited circumstances in accordance with law. (Labor Code 1032; 29 USC 207)

Before an employee's supervisor or District nurse makes a determination to deny lactation accommodations, he/she shall consult the Superintendent or designee. In any case in which lactation accommodations are denied, the Superintendent or designee shall document the options that were considered and the reasons for denying the accommodations.

LACTATION ACCOMMODATION (continued)

The District shall give permission to the employee or student to bring a breast pump and/or any other equipment used to express breast milk to the workplace or school campus. Access to a power source for the breast pump and/or other related equipment is also to be provided if needed.

Complaints of noncompliance with the requirements outlined above may be filed with the District under the Uniform Complaint procedure. The District shall respond to the complaint filed pursuant to paragraph (1) in accordance with Chapter 5.1 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations. The complainant may appeal the decision to the State Superintendent of Instruction. If there is merit in the appeal, the District shall provide a remedy to the affected employee or student.

IMMUNIZATIONS

To be admitted to school, children must be fully immunized in accordance with law. Children shall be excluded from school or exempted from immunization requirements only as allowed by law.

To protect the health of all students and staff and to curtail the spread of infectious diseases, the Board of Education shall cooperate with state and local public health agencies to encourage and facilitate immunization of all District students against preventable diseases.

NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

The Board of Education desires to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in the District's academic and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any District school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying of any student based on the student's actual race, color, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, or sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or gender expression; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

The Board also prohibits any form of retaliation against any student who files a complaint or report regarding an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate training and information to students, parents/guardians, and employees regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying, including, but not limited to, the District's nondiscrimination policy, what constitutes prohibited behavior, how to report incidents, and to whom such reports should be made.

Students who engage in discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to appropriate discipline, up to and including counseling, suspension, and/or expulsion. Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Grievance Procedures

The Principal of each school site is designated Coordinator for Nondiscrimination to handle complaints regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and to answer inquiries regarding the District's nondiscrimination policies.

Any school employee who observes an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying shall report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In addition, the employee shall immediately intervene when safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

Upon receiving a complaint of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the Coordinator shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with the District's uniform complaint procedures site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

The Board of Education recognizes that early marriage, pregnancy or parenting may disrupt a student's education and increase the chance of a student dropping out of school. The Board therefore desires to support married, pregnant, **lactating**, and parenting students to continue their education, attain strong academic and parenting skills, and to promote the healthy development of their children.

Access to a power source for the breast pump and/or other equipment is also to be provided if needed. A student shall also be provided with access to a place to store the breast milk safely. A student shall not incur any academic penalty as a result of her use of these reasonable accommodations during the school day and shall be allowed to make up any missed work.
