# Article XIV - SAFETY CONDITIONS

CSEA will propose language to address the use of cameras and GPS devices at District sites and in District vehicles.

## Article XVIII - VACATIONS

CSEA will make proposals to clarify the language and enhance the property right of bargaining unit employees.

#### Article XIX - HOLIDAY

CSEA will propose language to enhance the holidays offered to bargaining unit employees.

# ARTICLE XX - HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

CSEA will propose language to enhance the health and welfare benefits of bargaining unit members corresponding with the District's ability to pay.

Xander Meza, Carter High School student, spoke regarding having bad experiences at Carter High School due to being a part of the LBGT community and how she feels the Principal is treating her unfairly as a student and a band member. She also shared concerns regarding Carter High School substitute band teacher having no musical background.

Jennifer Broxmeyer, Carter High School parent, asked the Board to look into what is happening at Carter High School in regards to the Band Director. She spoke in support of Band Director, Ms. Holzbaugh

Priscilla Alexander, Carter High School student, spoke on behalf of her peers in the band and color guard program at Carter High School. She shared how devastating it is that their band teacher is not there. She asked the Board to help bring in someone to lead their program.

Maria Sandoval, parent, thanked the Board for all the things that the District has done well for the last few months. She stated that she wanted to speak on two formal complaints she turned in regarding Kucera Middle School (a copy of the complaints were given to the Board). She expressed her concems regarding a teacher conference she had with her son's teacher where the teacher, without notifying her, had her union representative present during the meet.

Nora Mendoza, Kucera Middle School parent, expressed her concerns regarding a formal complaint she submitted in regards to an AVID teacher at Kucera Middle School. She shared that she felt this teacher has many shortcomings and is emotionally abusing students, and constantly sending students to the PBIS office.

Celia Saravia, parent, representing a support group for parents of children with special needs, extended an invitation to Board Members for their annual celebration of the sacraments of special needs children. The event will be held on April 15, 2018, at 3:00 p.m., at the San Bernardino Cathedral, 2525 North Arrowhead Ave., San Bernardino. She congratulated the students of the Middle College Prep Academy and Dr. D'Souza for the success of the program. She congratulated Superintendent Avila and the Board for all the changes made in the District, and she is glad the Board is here to hear what parents have to say when issues arise, as many employees are opposed to changes.

## UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

The Board of Education recognizes that the District has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints whenever possible and appropriate. To resolve complaints which eannet be resolved through such informal may require a more formal process, the Board shall adopts athe uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The District's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints:

1. Any complaint alleging District violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, after school education and safety consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, and special education programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, and any other District-implemented program which is listed in Education Code 64000(a) (5 CCR 4610)

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The district shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. For any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep the identity of the complainant, and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, confidential when appropriate and as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

In filing and investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate for any complaint alleging retaliation, unlawful discrimination or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to District staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

- Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- 2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
- 3. Any complaint alleging employment discrimination shall be sent to the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the compliance officer shall notify the complainant by first class mail of the transfer.
- 4. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the California Department of Education.

In addition, the District's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.14, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments. (Education Code 35186)

### BOARD MEMBER ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

The Board of Education recognizes that electronic communication is an efficient and convenient way for among Board members to communicate and expedite the exchange of information within the district and with and between Board members, District administration, and members of the public is an efficient and convenient way to communicate and expedite the exchange of information and to help keep the community informed about the goals, programs, and achievements of the District and its schools. Board members shall exercise caution so as to ensure that electronic communications are not used as a means for the Board to deliberate outside of an agendized Board meeting nor to circumvent the public's right to access records regarding district business.

A majority of the Board shall not, outside of an authorized meeting, use a series of electronic communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. (Government Code 54952.2)

Examples of permissible electronic communications concerning district business include, but are not limited to, dissemination of Board meeting agendas and agenda packets, reports of activities from the Superintendent, and reminders regarding meeting times, dates, and places.

In addition, Board members may use electronic communications to discuss matters that do not pertain to district business, regardless of the number of Board members participating in the discussion.

Board members shall make every effort to ensure that their electronic communications conform to the same standards and protocols established for other forms of communication. A Board member may respond, as appropriate, to an electronic communication received form a member of the community and should make clear that his/her response does not necessarily reflect the views of the Board as a whole. Any complaint or request for information should

be forwarded to the Superintendent in accordance with Board bylaws and protocols so that the issue may receive proper consideration and be handled through the appropriate district process. ### BOARD DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

Citizens elected to The Board of Education are entrusted with the responsibility of governing District schools. The Board recognizes that its members need training believes that the Board's ability to effectively and responsibly govern the district is essential to promoting student achievement, building positive community relations, and protecting the public interest in district schools. Board member shall be provided sufficient opportunities for professional development that helps them understand their responsibilities, stay abreast of new developments in education, and develop boardsmanship skills.

There shall be inservice activities designed to assist Board members in their efforts to improve their skills as members of a policy making body.

All Board members may attend conferences for the purpose of Board development. Board business shall not be discussed at conferences.

The Board and/or the Superintendent or designee shall provide an orientation to newly elected or appointed Board members which includes comprehensive information regarding Board roles, policies, and procedures and the district's vision and goals, operations, and current challenges. Throughout their first term, Board members shall continue to participate in additional educational opportunities designed to assist them in understanding the principals of effective governance, including, but not limited to, information on school finance and budgets, student achievement and assessment, labor relations, community relations, program evaluation, open meeting laws (the Brown Act), conflict of interest laws, and other topics necessary to govern effectively and in compliance with law.

All Board members are encouraged to continuously participate in advanced training offered by the California School Boards Association in order to reinforce boardsmanship skills and build knowledge related to key education issues. Such activities may include online courses, webinars, webcasts, and in-person attendance at workshops and conferences. In addition, workshops and consultations may be held within the district on issues that involve the entire governance team.

### **BOARD DEVELOPMENT** (continued)

When a conference, convention or workshop is not attended by the full Board, those who do participate will be requested to share information, recommendations and materials acquired at the meeting.

Funds for participation at such meetings will be budgeted for on an annual basis. When funds are limited, the Board will designate which of its members would be the most appropriate to participate at a given meeting board training shall be budgeted annually for the Board and each Board member. In selecting appropriate activities, the Board and/or individual Board members shall consider activities that are aligned with the district's vision and goals and the needs of the Board or individual member to obtain specific knowledge and skills. The Board shall annually develop a board training calendar in order to schedule and track board training activities and to schedule opportunities for Board members to report on the activities in which they participated.

Board members may attend a conference or similar public gathering with other Board members and/or with the Superintendent or designee in order to develop common knowledge and understanding of an issue or engage in team-building exercises. In such cases, a majority of the Board members shall not discuss among themselves, other than as part of the scheduled program, business of a specified nature that is within the district's jurisdiction, so as not to violate the Brown Act open meeting laws pursuant to Government Code 54952.2.

## AMENDMENT NO. 2 TWINING CONSULTING, INC. AGREEMENT NO. C-17-0091

April 11, 2018

On December 7, 2016, the Board of Education approved an agreement with Twining Consulting, Inc. as the engineering firm to provide testing and inspection services for Eisenhower High School Stadium Renovation and Performing Arts Theater Projects. The original approved contract amount was not-to-exceed \$61,759.00 for the Stadium Renovation, and not-to-exceed \$157,244.00 for the Performing Arts Theater project.

Amendment No. 1 to the agreement was approved by the Board of Education on August 23, 2017, for an additional cost of \$12,371.00 for a total cost not-to-exceed \$74,130.00 for the Stadium Renovation. The increase was due to moisture issues during the grading of the stadium, and the intensive inspection of steel plates in the shop during the grading phase.

Consultant services are billed on a time-and-materials basis, and total fees are a function of the construction schedule, the type and frequency of the services requested by the Division of the State Architect (DSA) Inspector and DSA field engineer. In the original proposal the consultant's estimates were based on past experience, the information available from the architect at the time of the proposal, and general assumptions; however, many factors at the job site caused construction delays, and additional DSA field inspection requirements.

As a result, additional services were required, and Amendment No. 2 is necessary for additional compensation to Twining Consulting, Inc. due to the following unforeseen conditions:

### Stadium Renovation:

- An extension of five months to the original project schedule
- Soils Relocation of storm drain pipes due to design change and re-inspections
- Additional field inspections due to delayed final DSA approved design/ engineering of bleachers
- Press Box Compressor installation was added to the original scope of work
- Structural Steel Fabrication causing an extension of the production schedule requiring additional shop inspection hours

### Performing Arts Theater:

- An extension of five months to the original project schedule
- Soils Unidentified utility and communication lines
- Structural Steel Field Re-inspections of non-compliant work
- Weather conditions from rains and excessive heat impacted the frequency of inspection visits for Soils and Masonry

(Ref. K 2.1)

 Structural Steel Fabrication causing an extension of the production schedule requiring additional shop inspection hours

As a result, the Stadium Renovation project requires an additional amount not-to-exceed \$47,716.00 to the Amendment No. 1 amount of \$74,130.00 for a combined revised total not-to-exceed \$121,846.00, and the Performing Arts Theater project an additional amount not-to-exceed \$68,722.00 to the original agreement amount of \$157,244.00 for a combined revised total not-to-exceed \$225,966.00.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve Amendment No. 2 to the Agreement No. C-17-0091 with Twining Consulting, Inc. for additional services required to complete the Eisenhower High School Stadium Renovation for an additional amount not-to-exceed \$47,716.00 to the Amendment No. 1 amount of \$74,130.00 for a combined revised total not-to-exceed \$121,846.00, and additional services to complete the Eisenhower High School Performing Arts Theater Project additional amount not-to-exceed \$68,722.00 to the original agreement amount of \$157,244 for a combined revised total not-to-exceed \$225,966.00; thereby, the combined revised total cost of Agreement C-17-0091 for both projects is not-to-exceed \$347,812.00, to be paid from Fund 21 - Measure Y, Series "C", General Obligation funds with all other terms and conditions of the agreement remain the same.
