Darrell Peeden, representative from CalEITC4me, a non-profit organization which helps families build awareness, stated that he is a product of Rialto Unified School District and spoke of the California Earned Income Tax Credit (CalEITC4me), which is a tax credit for working families.

Paula Bailey, parent, thanked Claudia Hernandez, School Psychologist, for going above and beyond in providing the necessary support to a family who recently adopted a child with numerous challenges. She acknowledged Scott Sparks, Principal, Eisenhower High School, for all the activities that are being offered to the students of the school. She also expressed her excitement in the great things happening in Special

Education and the great job being done by Bridgette Ealy, Lead Special Services Agent.

PARTNERSHIP WITH UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, RIVERSIDE P20 PROGRAM

January 10, 2018

Education Services requests the Board of Education approve a joint partnership with the University of California, Riverside, Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP) sponsored by P20, a state funded initiative, for all middle schools: Frisbie, Jehue, Kolb, Kucera, and Rialto. The main goal of this program is to improve students' academic performances, particularly those who are first generation and socioeconomically disadvantaged, English Language Learners, and underrepresented students of color, in their pursuit of a postsecondary education and beyond.

The middle school principals have chosen to have this program in one or more of the following classes: College Prep Class for English Language Learners, math intervenion classes, RSP study skills class, or in an after school class primarily focusing on African-American students. The program provides support for 150 students from each school in the areas of Academic Advising, Academic Support, Teacher Support, and also involves the students in the Mathematics Engineering Science Achievement (MESA) Program. There is also a parent engagement component, summer program on UCR's campus, and campus tours for students who are identified in this program.

Each school will get two (2) site tutors for a total of 15 hours per week. These tutors are UCR undergraduates who will serve as good rolemodels for our students. The program will start with 7th grade students and follow them until they graduate from high school.

The District will work with the teachers to put a STEM curriculum in some of these classes. The STEM curriculum will serve to deliver the same curriculum to students, but in an engaging, hands-on, and innovative manner.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve a partnership with the University of California, Riverside, Early Academic Outreach Program sponsored by P20, a state funded initiative, for all middle schools to improve academic performances over a six-year period beginning with the 2017-2018 school year through 2022-2023, at no cost to the District.

AGREEMENT WITH SAN BERNARDINO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

January 10, 2018

Education Services requests the Board of Education approve an agreement with San Bernardino Community College District, Valley College Campus. The agreement would establish a college level course, Elements of Oceanography (Ocean 101), which is a three (3) unit college course for our 12th grade students from our three (3) comprehensive high schools (Carter, Eisenhower and Rialto), enrolled in the Middle College Program for the 2nd semester of the 2017-18 school year at the Cesar Chavez/Dolores Huerta Center for Education.

San Bernardino Valley College will provide one (1) qualified college instructor for the course to be offered as an after school class, one (1) day a week. Twenty-nine (29) students taking the course.

The cost to offer the course (contract cost) is \$15,158.88; textbook costs are estimated at \$40.00 per student, for a total cost of \$1,160.00. Fieldtrip expenses for students to visit Valley College and take the Accuplacer Test are estimated to be an additional \$3,000.00, for an overall total cost of \$19,318.88.

Students enrolled in this course will then be able to use the transferable credit from this class at any University of California and California State University.

RESOLUTION NO. 17-18-36 RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

RESOLUTION CALLING FOR FULL AND FAIR FUNDING OF CALIFORNIA'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS

January 10, 2018

WHEREAS, California has the sixth largest economy in the world, and the largest Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of any state in the nation; and

WHEREAS, despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K-12 school funding and school staffing; and

WHEREAS, California ranks 45th nationally in the percentage of taxable income spent on education, 41st in per-pupil funding, 45th in pupil—teacher ratios and 48th in pupil—staff ratios; and

WHEREAS, K-12 school funding has not substantially increased, on an inflation-adjusted basis, for more than a decade; and

WHEREAS, under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), state funding for K-12 schools has only this year recently returned to levels predating the Great Recession of 2007; and

WHEREAS, the modest revenue increases since the implementation of LCFF have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs for health care, pensions, transportation and utilities; and

WHEREAS, 58 percent of California's public school students are eligible for free and reduced-price lunch — 13 percent above the national average — and 23 percent of California students are English learners, more than twice the national average; and

WHEREAS, California's investment in public schools is out of alignment with its wealth, its ambitions, its demographics and the demands of a 21st-century education; and

WHEREAS, in 2007, a bipartisan group of California leaders commissioned a report titled *Getting Down to Facts*, which stated it would take an additional \$17 billion annually to meet the State Board of Education achievement targets for K-12 schools; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, a California School Boards Association (CSBA) report, California's Challenge: Adequately Funding Education in the 21st Century, updated the Getting Down to Facts data and determined that, adjusting for inflation, an additional \$22 billion to \$40 billion annually would be required to provide all public school students with access to a high-quality education; and

WHEREAS, California funds schools at roughly \$1,961 per student less than the national average, which translates to approximately \$3,462 per student when adjusted for California being a high-cost state; and

WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top 10 states by almost \$7,000 in perpupil funding; and

WHEREAS, in Robles-Wong v. State of California, a group of plaintiffs led by CSBA argued that California's school funding system violated Article IX of the State Constitution by denying all students access to an education that prepares them for economic security and full participation in our democratic institutions; and

WHEREAS, the California Supreme Court declined to hear the case by a 4-3 margin, prompting Justice Goodwin H. Liu to write: "It is regrettable that this court, having recognized education as a fundamental right in a landmark decision 45 years ago [Serrano v. Priest (1971) 5 Cal.3d 584], should now decline to address the substantive meaning of that right."; and

WHEREAS, in order to prepare our students for participation in a democratic society and an increasingly competitive, technology-driven global economy, California must fund schools at a level sufficient to support student success; and

WHEREAS, despite its vast wealth, California has consistently underfunded public education while widening its scope, adding new requirements and raising standards without providing appropriate resources to prepare all students for college, career and civic life; and


WHEREAS, if California is to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the State must provide schools with the resources to meet the needs of their specific populations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Rialto Unified School District, urges the State Legislature to fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level that is equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025 and to maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding until otherwise decreed.
