plying for employment, you will be offered the following services:

1. You will be interviewed in a manner to provide information to the students concerning your abilities and interests in relation to job opportunities.

2. If you are interested in obtaining information about particular occupations, resources will be available.

3. You will be referred for employment through Mrs. Gottlieb.

Applying for employment through the Occupational Placement Service, you should use the following procedure:

1. Obtain an application from Mrs. Gottlieb as soon as possible.

2. Fill out the application form completely.

3. Obtain your parent's signature on the application form with your counselor and obtain his signature.

5. Have the application signed by the attendance counselor.

6. Return the application to Mrs. Gottlieb.

If you are interested, bear in mind the importance of applying as soon as possible. Additional information may be obtained from Mrs. Gottlieb or by calling the Central Placement Office, TU 2-1791, ext. 37. Ask for Mr. Ralph O'Brien.

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STUDENTS WANT MORE FOOD IN CAFETERIA

For the past few weeks there has been quite a bit of controversy over the subject of the cafeteria food. It seems that many students are very dissatisfied with both the quality and quantity of the food.

In a recent survey taken by journalism students it revealed that out of 75 students nine of them liked the cafeteria food, 21 of them accepted the cafeteria food and 45 of them disliked the food completely.

Questions have come to my mind about the quantity of our food. Why if the price of the lunches were raised from 30 cents to 35 cents can't we have more food? Why can't the food be more appetizing? Why can't we have more of a variety?

I went to the lady in charge

of our cafeteria and talked to her about all these problems. She explained to me that the reason the price of the lunches went up a nickle from last year was because of the rise in food costs. She said that the cafeteria clears no profit whatsoever. Because the taxpayers refuse to give any support for feeding students, they had to raise the prices of the lunches to break even. You see, our EHS cafeteria is only one in all the San Bernardino City School systems. It would be totally impossible for just EHS to have a change in our food service. For an example, I think that the students as a whole in this school would much rather have an actual cafeteria, where there is a variety of entres and each individual item has a set price. As it stands now we do not have a cafeteria lunch, only a

hot plate lunch. But, being that we are only a "limb of the tree" in the San Bernardino System there can be no radical changes even if they were for the best.

I personally have no complaints as far as the fact that our meals aren't well balanced or healthy. For the exception of Friday's we usually have meat, potatoes and vegetables. My only complaint is there just isn't enough food that will fill up the average high school student.

This problem has gained much discussion among the student council members. One councilman thought that if each item of food was put on a separate dish and given a separate price, the student may then have a better selection. But if you bought the complete lunch, it would cost the student 35 cents. The ala carte features such as the soup, salad, pie, etc., would cost additional. The students could then take just what they wanted from the selection. This way there would be less food waste and many many more happy customers.

I feel it would satisfy many students if the cafeteria would put out bowls of tossed green salad with several varieties of salad dressing and bowls of soup that we the students could buy as extras. That way if we felt that we didn't get enough food for the day we could buy these ala carte entrees. Since the cafeteria is not interested in clearing any profit on their food these items would most likely cost the student about 12 cents.

I would like any and all comments from the readers of this paper pertaining to this subject. If we get any response from you we will run the subject on as a series in our future papers.

Eisenhower Eagles finished their regular season by edging the Aquinas Falcons, 57-51. The game began with the Aquinas jumping to an early lead. At the end of the first quarter, the Falcons led 18-13.

After the first quarter the Eagles adjusted to the Aquinas offense and held them to eight points. By the half the Eisenhower varsity grabbed a 28-26 lead.

By this time the spectators were really showing their enthusiasm. School spirit, as well as team spirit, was at a peak. For the rest of the game there wasn't a quiet moment.

The Falcon's rallied back in the third quarter to regain the lead. Going into the fourth quarter with a 44-39, the Falcons were unable to cope with sharpshooting of the Eagle gunners, Lucas and Gaumont. In the final period the EHS men picked-up 18 points to Aquinas 7.

Lucas of Eisenhower tallied 25 points compared to Murphy of Aquinas who scored 16. The Varsity team goes into CIF playoffs, with a ten straight win record, Feb. 28.

In the regular basketball season the Eisenhower Eagles have excelled in many ways. They have broken records, overcome hardships, maintained a lasting team spirit, and continually displayed fine sportsmanship. The Eagles started the season off with three straight wins against Victor Valley twice and Claremont once. They dropped their first game at Beaumont by a score of 31-53. Then they picked up another win, this time from Burroughs.

With school out for Christmas, the team really buckled down. They went to the Banning Tournament determined to make a fine show. They placed sixth out of 19 schools entered. Jack Lucas was named best defensive player of the tournament.

The Eagles dropped their next season game to Claremont, which they had formerly beaten. After downing Glendora, the largest school played, they lost to Rubidoux, a team they defeated in the Banning tournament, in an overtime. They then edged Valencia twice before downing Aquinas, then Servite 53-27 to make the homecoming program the success that it was. Bonita (60-46), a little bit harder than the following Servite game that the Eagles came out victorious.

The Beaumont game of Feb. 7 was a game to remember. The Eagles established an all-time scoring record of 105 points. As Coach Dowd stated, "As long as Eisenhower has baseball, this record will probably not fall." On Feb. 10, the Eagles made a spectacular come-back by defeating Rubidoux, 67-55. The last game of the season was one of the most highly spirited. Eisenhower rallied with Aquinas to win their 10th game in a row, another record. Another outstanding feature is that EHS qualified two years in a row for CIF playoffs.
