Class Elections May 10

Today marks the final phrase of the 1961-62 ASB elections. The campaigns, registration, and primary elections are behind us and the preparation for class elections are before us. The elections play a great part in the success of a high school. Perhaps that's why ours has to be so successful.

Those who were not elected to offices in the ASB elections may still file their intent to run for a class office within two school days after the general election. They will then be cleared through the eligibility committee, and proceed to get 60 valid signatures on their petitions.

Candidates for Junior or Senior class presidents must have a "B" average. Those running for vice president secretary, treasurer, or social chairman must maintain a "C" (2.0) average.

Junior and Senior class candidates' campaigns must not cost over: President, \$15.00; vice president, secretary, treasurer, and social chairman, \$10.00. Those who conduct campaigns, costing more than their allotted sums, will be subject to disqualification.

Registration for the Class Elections will be held for one day only, May 5.

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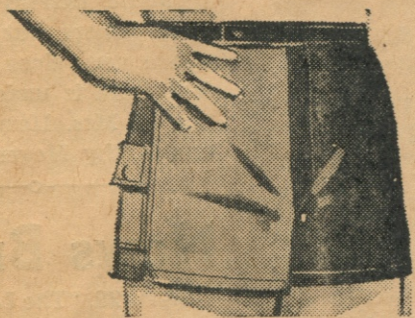
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INDUSTRIAL ARTS COURSES OFFER MANY OPPORTUNITIES

The industrial arts program is an important part of the educational program of California public schools. Those who have specialized in this subject may enter employment in specific industrial and service occupations and advance to a higher level of employment. There is a special college-bound course offered in this school for students planning to go into this field. The regular 200 semester credits, of which 30 may be an industrial arts course as a major field, are necessary for graduation.

Some of the many job opportunities from an industrial arts course are: Mechanical drawing - drafting, blue print reading, tool designing, architectural drawing; general metal work—air conditioning, machinist, aircraft fabrication, auto body repair, die making, welding, foundry operation; electronics — radio repair, guided missile, electronic computers; graphic arts — newspapers, advertising, press operator, print shop; and woodworking — pattern making, carpentry, cabinet shop, boat building, furniture, hobbies; and of course, many others.

At Eisenhower High School Mr. Anson Thompson and Mr. John Drew teach general metal. Mr. Joe Vidal teaches printing and electricity. Mr. Ernest Cann teaches drafting, and Mr. Donovan Peterson teaches woodshop. Much of the work on large school productions such as, the prom, graduation and other school affairs, is done efficiently by these teachers and their students. These people often do not receive credit where it is due. People take their many accomplishments for granted and therefore do not appreciate the hard work put into their projects. A good example of this is to ask how many students realize that our own metal shop made the Eagle in front of our school. It's a good job, isn't it?

People going into the industrial arts field will find that they are going into a wide field with many job opportunities. Examples are: Industrial engineering, electrical engineering, industrial arts teaching, industrial law, and the apprenticeship program. Those completing high school with an industrial arts major are eligible for semi-skilled, semi-technician, and junior apprenticeship.

When planning your future (which should be taking place at this very moment) take in mind what industrial arts has to offer.
