

Soph Elections Will Be Held

Would you like to be a sophomore class officer? Any sophomore wishing to run for one of the five offices available must file his intent to run with the vice principal by today, September 21. A candidate running for the office of president must have a 'B' (3.0) average, while other candidates must have a 'C' (2.0) average or better. Eligibility for candidacy will be cleared by September 24, when the candidate may take out his petition for office.

Those sophomores wishing to vote in the election may do so only by registering. Registration will be held from September 28 to October 3.

Primary elections will be Wednesday, October 3, while general

elections are scheduled for October 5.

October 2 is the date set for the candidate assembly. At that time the class will hear short talks from those hopefuls running for President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, or Social Chairman, respectively.

All posters and campaign materials must be approved by Secretary of Interior, Jane Healey, or by one of the vice principals, Mrs. Dollahan or Mr. Schumacher. Posters are limited to size and number. No campaign may interfere with regular class activity.

Election results will be announced immediately after all returns are tallied.

Bees Are Set for 1962 Lid-Lifter

The Bee footballers which coaches Walt Wohlers and Dick King put on the field in the preliminary contest at Lennox shapes up to be a spirited, hard driving aggregation, to be counted on for the same brand of football that previous Eisenhower Bee elevens have been known for.

The combination of Carl Gunn and Don Elenburg, both Bee veterans, at the halfback slots should provide most of the offensive drive. A crippling blow was dealt the team when their first string quarterback, sophomore Don Campbell, broke his ankle during a practice session. Charles Aylor, a transfer from Gridley High in Northern California, seems to have given Coach Wohlers a temporary reprieve in this position however. Charles played halfback on Gridley's JV team last year.

Forty-four sophomores turned out for the Bees, and the coaching staff now is faced with the very pleasant problem of trying to find a place for them. Sophs showing promise to date include Paul Brown and Roy Pohlman in the line and Greg Furnas at fullback.

Coach Wohlers expressed regret that one of last year's star lettermen, junior Angelo Madrigal, had been sent up to the varsity. Madrigal was used extensively at halfback last year, and should provide needed bench strength on the varsity.

It looks like this year's Bees can be counted on for a winning record, but as

Coach Wohlers stated, "No position on the team is set, and we've got to work with until after tonight."

Transfers, B-Grads Bolster Eisenhower's Tyro Varsity

Eisenhower's "question mark" Eagles open the 1962 grid campaign with a trip to unheard-of, unscouted Lennox, somewhere in Los Angeles County. The varsity kick-off, follows the 6:00 p.m. B tilt.

Coach Milt Smaha, with only four lettermen, from last year's wars — Van Dunlop, Tom Gallavan, Bill Bachar and Boyce Gire — will draw the bulk of his material from Ike's B champs of a year ago, transfers from all over the nation and even a few who haven't

played since junior high. Ironically, both Bachar and Gallavan have had early season injuries and will not be in Friday's lineup.

"We've got an improved passing attack," relates Coach Smaha, "and we just might surprise some people." John Blair, two-sport varsity letterman as a sophomore, will handle the quarter-backing and is the main reason for Smaha's optimism. And with 6'2 1/2" end Danny Roberts, a jnior who didn't even play last season, the Eagles will have a one-two aerial combination they've been lacking since Jerry Koch and Duane White graduated.

In the meantime, a top-secret, prototype "Eagle defense" has been virtually unbeatable in intersquad tussles and Monday's controlled scrimmage with Aquinas.

Tonight's offensive lineup should find Roberts at left end; senior Jim Ellerd, 263-pound, 6'3" recruit from Yuba City, at left tackle; junior Steve Hamlin, 200-pound ex-B at left guard; another junior, Carl Allen, 6', 200 pounds at center; Phil Carmen, two-year B letterman at right guard; Steve Mintz, 182 pound ex-B at right tackle, and at right end Darrell Russell, at 145 pounds, the smallest and quickest man on the line.

In the backfield, along with Blair, will go Gire at fullback, senior Joel Bailey, returning to Rialto after four years in France, at left half, and either Dunlop or little Angelo Madrigal, another junior, at right half.

Just on the outside and liable to see plenty of action tonight are Rick Martinez, a senior quarterback and rugged linebacker from San Bernardino High, Tim Russell, defensive end, Fred Easton and Jim Parell, both dependable interior lineman, and John Wooten, hardworking junior tackle.
