1. Public Comments from the Floor: At this time, any person wishing to speak on any item **not on** the Agenda will be granted three minutes.

Felicia Jones, Associate Director with Congregations Organized for Prophetic Engagement (COPE) and parent of an Eisenhower High School student, spoke about her concern with the proposal by the Cal-State system to extend the A-G requirements for all incoming freshman to take four (4 years) of math for admission into the CSU system. She talked about the reasons over 60 organizations across the state are opposing this proposal and urges the District to pay attention to this and learn about it, as it will impact the District, and low income students of color.

Celia Saravia, representing Amigos Unidos, a parent support group for children with special needs, thanked Ms. Rhea McIver Gibbs and Bridgette Ealy for their assistance is solving a problem very quickly. She is grateful for being able to count on our administration team which she feels it is due to Dr. Avila. She thanked Dr. Avila for the confidence and trust he has on administration, teachers, parents and the Board. She also shared that she is very proud of our Board, our Superintendent and staff for taking the problem of bullying seriously and giving parents the confidence that they are working together to address this issue.

Justin Bailey, High School senior at Milor High School invited everyone to sponsor him in a Skate-A-Thon which will take place on September 15, 2019. He shared that it is a great opportunity to support a STEM based activity which includes both educational components as well as physical activity in a safe environment.

Mirna Ruiz, Rialto PTA President, invited everyone to support a PTA fundraiser, "Lunch at the District" to raise money for High School senior scholarships. The fundraiser will consist of a taco lunch sale to take place at the Dr. John R. Kazalunas Education Center, West Wing, on Thursday, September 5, 2019, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. They will also be taking lunch orders from schools sites and making deliveries to the sites. REA will be paying for the costs associated with the conference. She also asked the Board to be inclusive by commemorating a pride month during a Board meeting in support of LGBTQ.

Chris Cordasco, CSEA Chapter 203 President, shared his concern with item H-16 which involved transportation services being contracted out of

BULLYING

The Board of Education recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student well-being, student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student. No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, visual, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel, retaliate against them for filing a complaint or participating in the complaint resolution process.

To the extent possible, District and schools shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of District and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying.

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As appropriate, the District shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. Such training shall be designed to provide staff with the skills to:

- 1. Discuss the diversity of the student body and school community, including their varying immigration experiences
- 2. Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

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Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and eafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians or victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

Reporting and Filing of Complaints

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee.

Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or District compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the District compliance officer identified I AR 1312.3—Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site r service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee shall file a request with the networking site r service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a District compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be giving an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

Investigation and Resolution of Complaints

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the District's uniform procedures specified in AR 1312.3. If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Discipline

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive

as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with District policies and regulations.

SEXUAL HEALTH AND HIV/AIDS PREVENTION INSTRUCTION

The Board of Education desires to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction on comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention. The District's education program shall address the goals of the California Healthy Youth Act pursuant to Education Code 51930-51939, including providing provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them-from risks presented by sexually transmitted infections, and unintended pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking and to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors. The District's educational program shall also promote students' understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development and-their the development of healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family.

Comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education shall be offered to all students in grades 7-12, including at least once in middle school and at least once in high school. (Education Code 51934)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate methods for informing the school community about subjects related to the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. The Superintendent or designee shall use such identified methods to inform parents/guardians of students in grades 6-12 about human trafficking prevention resources, as required pursuant to Education Code 49381

The District's curriculum shall support the purposes of the California Healthy Youth Act as specified in Education Code 51930-51939, be unbiased and inclusive of all students in the

classroom, and be aligned with the State's content standards shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

The Board shall consider the advisory committee's recommendations when approving the District's program.

Parent/Guardian Consent

Annually, At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified, in the manner specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, that they may request in writing that their child be excused from participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51938, 51939)

SUFFICIENCY OF STANDARDS-ALLIGNED TEXTBOOKS AND INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

September 11, 2019

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Rialto Unified School District, in order to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 60119 (as revised by Chapter 900, Statutes of 2004), EC section 60421 (a), and California Code of Regulation Title 5, section 9531 (a) held a public hearing on September 11, 2019, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education provided at least ten (10) days notice of the public hearing posted in at least three public places within the District that stated the time, place, and purpose of the hearing, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education encouraged participation by parents, teachers, members of the community, and bargaining unit leaders in the public hearing, and;

WHEREAS, information provided at this public hearing for the Board of Education detailed the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students in the District, including English Learners, and;

WHEREAS, the definition of "sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials" means that each pupil has standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and/or to take home, and may have digital access to;

WHEREAS, consistent with recommended adoption cycles and content of curriculum frameworks, sufficient standards aligned textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English Learners, in mathematics, science, history-social science, and Reading/Language Arts, including the English language development component of the adopted English/Language Arts program, and;

WHEREAS, as part of the required hearing, the Board of Education must also make a written determination as to whether each pupil enrolled in a foreign language or health course has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the adoption cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the State Board for those subjects, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education shall also determine the availability of laboratory science equipment as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9 through 12.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that for the 2019-2020 school year, the Rialto Unified School District has provided each pupil with sufficient standards-aligned textbooks and instructional materials consistent with the law, adoption cycles, content of curriculum frameworks, and State advisories.

RELATIVE TO THE UNAUDITED ACTUALS 2018-2019 AND

ESTIMATED 2019-2020 GANN APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT

Background:

The passage of Proposition 4 (Article XIIIB of the Constitution of the State of California) in November 1979, established constitutional limits on appropriations (Gann Limits) for fiscal years beginning July 1, 1980. These limitations apply only to unrestricted state and local income. Beginning in 1989-1990, the State redefined the state aid that counts toward school district Gann Limits to be "the amount which fills up a district's Gann Limit." Consequently, only districts with extremely high levels of property taxes will

be over their Gann Limits.

Reasoning:

Education Code sections 1629 and 42123 specify that by September 15 of each year, the governing boards of districts and county offices of education shall adopt a resolution identifying their estimated appropriations limit for the current year and their actual appropriations limit for the preceding year.

Fiscal Impact:

Recommendation: Accept the District's actual appropriations limit for the 2018-19 fiscal year as \$252,817,562. The District's estimated appropriations limit for the 2019-20 fiscal year is \$259,505,446. It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution 19-20-11, which declares that the Gann Limit appropriations in the 2018-2019 Unaudited Actuals and 2019-2020 Budget do not exceed the limitations imposed by Proposition 4.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Rialto Unified School District Board of Education provides public notice that the attached calculations and documentation of the Gann Limits for the 2018-19 and 2019-20 fiscal years are made in accordance with applicable constitutional and statutory law;

Background:

The District is in need of a Construction Management firm for the Full Day Kindergarten Relocatable Classroom Project at the following eight (8) school sites: Casey, Preston, Trapp, Boyd, Dollahan,

Morgan, Dunn and Morris Elementary Schools.

Reasoning:

After following the District's competitive selection process and requesting Statements of Qualifications, a list of qualified construction managers, which includes Ledesma & Meyer Construction Company, Inc., was approved by the Board of Education on April 22, 2015. Since that time, Ledesma & Meyer Construction Company, Inc. has done several projects in our District and staff has confidence that they can deliver this project within the

District's timeline and budget.

Recommendation: Approve Ledesma & Meyer Construction Company Inc., to perform Construction Management Services and provide General Conditions for the Full Day Kindergarten Relocatable Classroom Project at Casey, Preston, Trapp, Boyd, Dollahan, Morgan, Dunn and Morris Elementary Schools. The estimated cost of \$798,000.00 is based on the completion of the project through project closeout.

ITEM: AMENDMENT NO.1 WITH THINK TOGETHER, INC.

Background: On June 12, 2019, the Board of Education approved an agreement with

THINK Together, Inc. to provide an after school program contingent to the District granted funding, to eighteen (18) elementary sites and five (5) middle schools which offers arts, math, and science, and additional enrichment that includes visual, performing arts, healthy living (which includes physical fitness activities, nutrition, education, strategies for resolving conflict and character education, and student leadership development.) Secondary goals include improving the health and fitness of our student participants, and providing a broad array of engaging learning

opportunities.

Reasoning: On July 11, 2019, the California Department of Education (CDE) issued a

notification that the After School Education and Safety (ASES) grantees that due to a \$50 million augmentation in the 2019/2020 state budget, all ASES grants would be increased by 8.4%. These increased grant awards are now reflected in the CDE's ASSIST system and can be viewed online. The terms of our contract to provide ASES program services to the district during the 2019-2020 school year allots 100% of the district's ASES award in the amount of \$\$2,918,126.03 to Think Together, and provides for a prorate adjustment if the grant award amount changes. Student Services requests to amend the agreement to include the increased amount of

\$245,122.59 increasing the grant to \$3,163,248.62.

Recommendation: Approve Amendment No.1 to the agreement with THINK Together, Inc. a

non-profit corporation, for the for the purpose of providing the After School Educational and Safety (ASES) program at eighteen (18) elementary and five (5) middle school sites in the District. The term of the contract will be July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 with an option to renew for (2) two subsequent years. Payment not to exceed 100% of the grant of \$3,163,248.62 for the 2019-2020 fiscal year and fees will be renegotiated

subsequent years, if district exercises renewal options.

Fiscal Impact: \$3,163,248.62 - General Fund
