DRESS AND GROOMING

The Board of Education believes that appropriate dress and grooming contribute to a productive learning environment. The Board expects students to give proper attention to personal cleanliness and to wear clothes clothing that are is suitable for the school activities in which they participate. Students' clothing must not Students shall not wear clothing that present a health or safety hazard or a distraction which would interfere with the educational process or is likely to cause a substantial disruption to the educational program.

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District and school rules pertaining to student attire shall be included in student handbooks, may be posted in school offices and classrooms, and may be periodically reviewed with all students as necessary.

Students shall not be prohibited from dressing in a manner consistent with their gender identity or gender expression or with their religious or cultural observance.

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The principal or designee is authorized to enforce this policy and shall inform any student who does not reasonably conform to the dress code. The dress code shall not be enforced in a manner that discriminates against a particular viewpoint or results in a disproportionate application of the dress code based on students' gender, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, household income, or body type or size.

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School administrators, teachers, and other staff shall be notified of appropriate and equitable enforcement of the dress code.

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When practical, students shall not be directed to correct a dress code violation during instructional time or in front of other students.

DRESS AND GROOMING (continued)

Students and parents/guardians shall be informed about dress and grooming standards at the beginning of the school year and whenever these standards are revised. A student who violates these standards shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action. Repeated violations or refusal to comply with the district's dress code may result in disciplinary action.

Gang-Related Apparel

The principal, staff, and parents/guardians at a school may establish a reasonable dress code that prohibits students from wearing gang-related apparel when there is evidence of a gang presence that disrupts or threatens to disrupt the school's activities. Such a proposed dress code may be included as part of the school safety plan and must shall be presented to the Board, which for approval. The Board shall approve the plan upon determining that it is necessary to protect the health and safety of the school's students school environment. The dress code policy may be included in the school's comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 35183)

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When determining specific items of clothing that may be defined as gang apparel, the school shall ensure that the determination is free from bias based on race, ethnicity, national origin, immigration status, or other protected characteristics.

Uniforms

The Board may approve a school-initiated dress code requiring students at the school to wear a school uniform whenever the Board determines that such a dress code will promote student achievement, a positive school climate, and/or student safety.

In order to promote student safety and discourage theft, peer rivalry, and/or gang activity, the principal, staff, and parents/guardians at a school may establish a reasonable dress code requiring students to wear uniforms.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures whereby parents/guardians may choose to have their children exempted from the school uniform policy. Students shall not be penalized academically, otherwise discriminated against, or denied attendance to school if their parents/guardians so decide. (Education Code 35183)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that resources are identified to assist economically disadvantaged students in obtaining uniforms. (Education Code 35183)

BULLYING

The Board of Education recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student well-being, student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student. No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, visual, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel, retaliate against them for filing a complaint or participating in the complaint resolution process.

Cyberbullying includes the creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identify in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in District schools shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plans, the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable District and school plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop sStrategies for addressing bullying in district schools shall be developed with the involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development and implementation of ioint

effective strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

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To the extent possible, District and schools shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of District and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying.

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As appropriate, the District shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

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Staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective response.

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The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. Such training shall be designed to provide staff with the skills to:

- 1. Discuss the diversity of the student body and school community, including their varying immigration experiences
- Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

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Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and eafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians or victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee.

Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or District compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the District compliance officer identified I AR 1312.3 Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site r service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee shall file a request with the networking site r service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a District compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be giving an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

Investigation and Resolution of Complaints

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the District's uniform procedures specified in AR 1312.3. If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Discipline

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive

as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with District policies and regulations.

SEXUAL HEALTH AND HIV/AIDS PREVENTION INSTRUCTION

The Board of Education desires to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction on comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention. The District's education program shall address the goals of the California Healthy Youth Act pursuant to Education Code 51930-51939, including providing provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them-from risks presented by sexually transmitted infections, and unintended pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking and to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors. The District's educational program shall also promote students' understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development and-their the development of healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family.

The district shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

Comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education shall be offered to all students in grades 7-12, including at least once in middle school and at least once in high school. (Education Code 51934)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate methods for informing the school community about subjects related to the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. The Superintendent or designee shall use such identified methods to inform parents/guardians of students in grades 6-12 about human trafficking prevention resources, as required pursuant to Education Code 49381

The District's curriculum shall support the purposes of the California Healthy Youth Act as specified in Education Code 51930-51939, be unbiased and inclusive of all students in the

classroom, and be aligned with the State's content standards shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

The Superintendent or designee may appoint a coordinator and/or an advisory committee regarding the District's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention curriculum. The advisory committee shall represent a divergence of viewpoints and may participate in planning, implementing, and evaluating the District's comprehensive sexual health education program. The Board shall consider the advisory committee's recommendations when approving the District's program.

Parent/Guardian Consent

Annually, At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified, in the manner specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, that they may request in writing that their child be excused from participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51938, 51939)

FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Background: The District formed a Boundary Advisory Committee (BAC) in fall 2018 to

study and make a recommendation on adjustments to the attendance boundaries for various schools. The BAC met five times from January 2019 to May 2019, culminating on June 11, 2019, at a community input meeting where the recommended elementary school attendance boundary adjustments were presented to parents/guardians, and the community. In addition, we have sent out letters to all of the parents/guardians that will and/or can be affected by this change. Furthermore, follow-up phone calls were made and we will be re-running our list to capture any new students in

the spring of 2020.

Reasoning: The objective of a boundary study is to balance existing capacities with

projected enrollment and keep in alignment with the District strategic plans of "effective communication throughout the community" (Strategy 8, Plan 4) and "effective family and community involvement" (Mission) by encouraging students who live in the same neighborhood to attend the school closest to them (neighborhood schools). The study also addressed the importance of common concerns and the criteria used to make the adjustments; such as, special programs, AVID, Dual Language Immersion, Special Education, safe routes to schools, effective use of existing school facilities and

resources, etc., which shall be preserved.

Formal approval by the Board of Education is necessary to implement the

proposed boundary adjustments for the 2020-2021 school year.

Recommendation: Approve the attendance boundary adjustments for the elementary schools

to be implemented in the 2020-2021 school year.

ARTICLE VI – UNIT MEMBER RIGHTS

Section 4 - Health and Benefits

- D. Unit members working in a long-term assignment (21-days or more) shall be eligible for personal necessity leave, not to exceed three days/18 hours, for any of the following:
 - Death of a relative who is not covered under bereavement
 - District employee or a student of the Rialto Unified School District
 - A close friend
 - An unforeseen crisis involving the unit member's property. Such crisis must be serious in nature, involve circumstances the unit member cannot disregard, and require the attention of the unit member during the member's assigned hours of service

Personal Necessity shall be deducted from and shall not exceed the number of full-paid days of sick leave to which the unit member is entitled for the school year.

The unit member will be subject to appropriate discipline if the Personnel Necessity Leave is used for purposes other than the above circumstances.
